Dear People of God

Every Palm Sunday, the Church presents to us two gospel readings, one at the beginning of the Mass and the other during the usual time for the Gospel. The bipolar nature of the two gospels in portraying the height and low of the peoples' attestation of Jesus' earthly ministry shines out clearly: one, the acceptance and the popular acclamation of the triumph of his ministry, and the other, the rejection and the demand for His crucifixion on a cross. I think the church is trying to make us see that the cross can follow every crown, and see that the crown does sometimes follows every cross of the human life – in as much as we are resigned, after doing our best, to God's will. So hard sometimes, to see one hidden behind the other.

In the first gospel, we saw how the people acclaim Jesus as the King who was to come into the world, the Messiah, the son of David. Jesus riding on a donkey, entered Jerusalem triumphantly. The second gospel shows the same crowd shouting 'crucify Him' before Pilate who could have released him but did not because he felt under pressure to do the will of the angry crowd. However, the gospels were clear on the fact that Jesus was aware that His going into Jerusalem would merit him the cross and crucifixion. Boldly and courageously, he still continued his journey by his triumphant entry into Jerusalem. He could have avoided it. He could have listened to his apostles who tried to discourage him. But why would he knowingly and willingly proceed to that place where he would have suffering and pains, blows and betrayals, cross and crucifixion, agony and death? Was he comfortable and eager to have all that?

He was not at all. The intensity of his prayers at the garden of Gethsemane, where he prayer to the Father to save him from suffering showed he never wanted to experience the sufferings and death on a cross. He prayed until he was sweating out blood asking that the cup of suffering be taken from him, nevertheless, he, in that prayer, resigned his will to the will of his Father. After that prayers, Jesus became ready to lay down his life for the salvation of souls and for the glory of God. In that prayer we could see the intimate relationship between Jesus and the Father; his willingness to obey and do the will of the Father unconditionally.

Since it was for the salvation of souls and in accord with the will of God, Jesus did what the prophet Isaiah said of him in the first reading: "For my part, I made no resistance, neither did I turn away. I offered my back to those who struck me, my cheeks to those who tore at my beard; I did not cover my face against insult and spittle. The Lord comes to my help, so that I am untouched by the insults. So, too, I set my face like flint; I know I shall not be shamed." Yes, God did not allow Him to be shamed. Because he was obedient unto death, St Paul in the second reading says that "God raised him high and gave him the name which is above all other names so that all beings in the heavens, on earth and in the underworld, should bend the knee at the name of Jesus and that every tongue should acclaim Jesus Christ as Lord, to the glory of God the Father. God raised him up and gave Him a Name." Yes, the assurance of resurrection was his strength. His faith unmoved, His hope sure and His love for God and souls overwhelming.

Dear friends, we may not have the opportunity to face the type of sufferings Jesus faced: the false accusations, the unjust trials and condemnation, the carrying of the cross, the crucifixion, the shameful and untimely death, but we are called each day to carry our crosses, if it is the will of God and follow Him. We are called to carry the cross of prayers even when we do not want it or feel like having it; to carry our cross of fasting, our cross of righteous living and our cross of loving God and neighbours, even the worst of neighbours, unconditionally without complaining. Each of us saying to ourselves as we carry our crosses, "The Lord comes to my help, I know I shall not be shamed" Have the best of the Holy Week.
